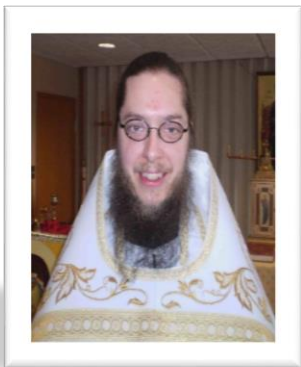


DR. DANIEL SMITH

Dr. Smith is currently Associate Professor of New Testament Language and Literature and Clark and Mary Wright Chair of New Testament Theology, Faculty of Theology Huron University College.

Smith is a graduate of

Wycliffe College (M.Rel.) and the University of St Michael's College, University of Toronto (Ph.D.). His research interests include the Synoptic Gospels (especially Q) and the death and resurrection of Jesus; his last book, *Revisiting the Empty Tomb: The Early History of Easter* (Fortress, 2010), has also appeared in French (2013). Dan is an active member of the Society of Biblical Literature and the Society for New Testament Studies, and presents often at churches and at academic conferences in Canada, the United States, and Europe. Dr. Smith's course, "**Reconsidering the Parables of Jesus**", looks at these portions of Scripture which have delighted and perplexed Christians – and especially Christian preachers! – for millennia. With so much interpretive history (and baggage), is it possible to hear and preach the parables again with their original vitality, surprise, and challenge?



THE REV'D DR. JOHN PALMER

Originally from Fredericton, Fr John Palmer completed his undergraduate studies at St. Thomas University, graduating with First-Class Honours with Distinction in

Philosophy. His postgraduate studies include a Master of Arts in Patristics from Durham University (England), and a Doctorate in Homiletics from the

Department of Theology of the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki (Greece). Fr John was ordained to the diaconate in 2011 and served at St Anthony's Church in the Metropolis of Thessaloniki (Church of Greece) for two years before returning to Canada in 2013 at which point he was ordained to the priesthood and appointed rector of the Holy Lady of Vladimir Mission in St John's Newfoundland where he continues to serve today. Fr John's, course is "**The Church as Hospital in Orthodox Self-Consciousness**". St. John Chrysostom tells us that, "...the Church is an admirable surgery, not for bodies, but for souls." This course will strive to unpack the Holy Chrysostom's statement by answering fundamental questions such as: what is spiritual illness, how and where is it cured, and what are the marks of a properly functioning spiritual hospital?



CANON DR. ROSS HEBB

A Nova Scotia native, Dr. Hebb has been a cleric in the Diocese of Fredericton since 1985, currently as Rector of St. Peter's Parish (Fredericton) A graduate of King's College, Halifax (BA, History,1981), and Dalhousie (MA, Classics,

1986) he received his PhD in Theology and Religious Studies from the University of Wales, Lampeter (2003). His dissertation, *The Church of England in Loyalist New Brunswick: 1783-1825* was published the next year. His other published works include, *Samuel Seabury and Charles Inglis: Two Bishops, Two Churches*, (FDU Press, 2010) and *Letters Home: Maritimers in the Great War: 1914-1918* was published by Nimbus (2014). Current research is focussing on New Brunswick women and men who served as nurses and chaplains during the Great War. Dr. Hebb's course will be, "**Origins of a Communion in Crisis**". This course will delve into the origins of the Anglican Communion. It will be argued that the Communion's origins provide a key, perhaps the essential key, to understanding our present differences and divisions.
